Johannes Vermeer, Woman Reading a Letter

Easter 6 focuses upon the theme of what it means to live as an Easter Christian: namely the life of friendship grounded and founded in the fact that Jesus Christ makes us his friends. In a sense Christianity is a faith of enchantment, to quote Max Weber, where the ordinary becomes extraordinary, where enchantment takes hold.

Johannes Vermeer was a little- known artist in 17th century Holland: just another 'genre painter'. He worked all his life in the town of Delft and died destitute. The times in which he painted were not his times. Paintings typically represented the rising merchant/business class - usually men - who bank-rolled portraits mirroring their success. Vermeer on the other hand, had the gift of seeing the extraordinary in the mundane – friendship offered through seemingly ordinary and bland actions: servant milkmaids in the kitchen pouring milk, women sitting sowing at the doors of their simple homes – and above, the beautiful depiction above of a young woman, dressed in blue, simply reading a letter. What is clear, is that this *ordinary depiction of the woman in blue is an extraordinary moment of friendship with a beloved*.

Today Bruce as preacher will pursue the theme of 'Opposite Action', an important behavioural principle in psychology with sound application for Christian spirituality, where an ordinary moment may be transformed into something extraordinary, as we seek to respond to our everchanging situations and challenges in new life-changing ways. 'Opposite action' opens the path to new possibilities and friendships.

A Confession of Our Human Condition and the Power that Friendship with God Gives Us Shaping our Actions (from a narrative in the film "Mississippi Burning")

Setting

On Sunday morning after spending six days struggling to create meaning from life, the people of Bearden, Tennessee, would go to church, because they knew Jesus was going to be there.

Sister Ora Wallace would begin the familiar hymn. Immediately the entire congregation would join her because they felt the presence of Jesus.

When the pastor would say,

"I know the Lord is in this place! Can I get a witness?"

The people responded with shouts of praise saying "Amen" and "Halleluiah"!

Through song, prayer and sermon the community affirmed Jesus' presence and their willingness to make it through their troubled situation.

Some would smile and others would cry.
Someone, depending upon the Spirit's effect on her,
would clap her hands and tap her feet.

All of these expressions were but black people bearing witness to Jesus' presence among them.

He was the divine power in their lives...

How could black people know they were human beings when they were treated like cattle?

How could they know that they were somebody, when everything in their environment said they were nobody? How could they know that they had value that could not be defined in dollars and cents, when the historical symbol of the auction block was an ever-present reality?

Only because they knew that Christ was present with them. That his presence generated the love and friendship they experienced in their Christian community.

This gave the lie to the reality outside enabled them to respond in ways to what may be expected.

They responded with actions offering their friendship of protest.

Confession

We confess our need for deep friendships, for those conversations that extend into the night, both pleasurable and difficult:

for sharing who we are and receiving from others.

We confess our vulnerability lubricated by laughter:

and sometimes tears.

We confess our difficulty in managing our emotions.

Allowing them to take-over,

inhibiting our capacity to live prayerfully, deeply and creatively:

may your friendship transform us

being ordinary people to becoming extraordinary people!
